When Jesus was physically here on earth, what would it have been like to be one of the disciples? What would the conversations have been about? I think they would have been about adding value to you. About listening to you. About loving you. When Jesus was in any sort of social setting, do you know what His natural reaction was? To serve. Why? Because He was full. He didn't need anything from anyone. He came simply to add, to serve, to complete. His idea of "working a room" wasn't networking, smooth-talking, or manipulating people for His own benefit. It was to make sure everyone walked out knowing God better than when they walked in.

You've probably met a few people who are truly secure. They have a sense of contentment in their lives. They know who they are. They are not concerned with comparison or competition; they are at peace, and they continually add value to others. Maybe you are one of those people. I know I want to be one. I want to live like Jesus.

Jesus always seems to find creative ways to add value to people. You know that kind of person – no matter how bad the meal was you just cooked, they find a way to compliment it. No matter how crazy your kids are behaving, they find a way to make you feel like amazing parents of amazing children. Can you imagine what it would look like if all of us – families, friends, churches – lived and loved from a place of inner fullness? It would look a lot like heaven on earth.

John 1:16 says that we have received from His fullness. How do we receive? We don't earn it. We don't deserve it. We don't develop it. We simply trust it, believe it, and receive it. Our mindset should be: "God, I receive from Your fullness today. I am who I am by Your grace. I find my rest and contentment in who You are through me." I'm not talking about repeating some formula or magic prayer. I'm talking about becoming aware of what God has already made available to us. We can receive from Jesus' fullness to the point where we are emotionally, mentally, and spiritually filled.

This eradicates one of the greatest hurdles in relationships and community: insecurity. Insecurity is more than just an emotion; it is a deep sense of deficiency and incompleteness. It paralyzes us relationally and socially. It isolates us. People can be all around us, yet we feel profoundly alone, because we think we don't measure up or we aren't good enough.

I've got bad news and good news. The bad news is we are right in our self-assessment. We don't measure up and we aren't good enough. But the good news is Jesus is enough. He's more than enough. And if we lean on Him and receive from Him, we will be enough as well. We all need community. When we find our security and completeness in Jesus, His fullness helps us become better friends, better spouses, better parents, better employees, better neighbors ... better servants of Christ!

It's amazing how many people I run into who say, "I just don't have any good friends anymore." You would think it would be easier to make friends the older we get, but in fact, it's often harder. We get burned, we get disillusioned, we get manipulated, and eventually we give up. We start to keep people at arm's length to protect ourselves.

Jesus wants to remove the scar tissue – to wholly heal. He wants to help us relate socially the way He did – thinking of and serving others. Ironically, we are most protected against hurt not when we withdraw and isolate ourselves, but when we serve others with no strings attached.

Jesus is the relationship that completes us. When we find true friendship in Him, it frees us to discover real relationships with others at a level we never thought possible. Jesus is the one who fills us. And when we're full, we're free. How can you serve others today?

All of us have experienced times like that and Oatman's words suggest in order to overcome our fears we need to pray and aim for higher ground. The hymn can be found in our hymnal - #549 and we will be singing it in the near future.
